(x)	How can you minimise intrusion of those who may be monitored if specific concerns have been raised.	 All staff are vetted by Surrey Police and licensed by the Security Industries Authority. Intrusion is minimised with the employment of high trained and high-quality CCTV operators who are made aware of all strands of diversity and human rights. Any concerns may also be reduced by effective communication with community groups with a transparent two-way interaction. Consultation with residents will be encouraged where those residents might have privacy concerns. Here, Digital Privacy Zones (DPZ) can also be applied where CCTV cameras have a capability to view private dwellings
