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<p>Exploitation of Vulnerable Children</p>	<p>Child Sexual Exploitation, (CSE) is the sexual abuse of a child or young person aged under 18 by an adult who involves them in inappropriate sexual activities either with themselves or another person. The activity often takes place in exchange for money, alcohol, drugs, food, accommodation or presents such as clothing or mobile phones, and victims can be targeted in person or online.</p> <p>County Lines is when gangs and organised crime networks exploit children to sell drugs. They use dedicated mobile phone 'lines' to supply drugs.
